Dear Friends,

On the calendar of the Roman Catholic Church, October 3 is the feast of one of my favorite saints, St. Therese of Lisieux, popularly known as "the Little Flower of Jesus."

Therese was born in 1873 in Alençon, France. A pious child, she became a Carmelite nun, taking the name "Therese of the Child Jesus and of the Holy Face." What I like most about St. Therese is her approach to the spiritual life, which has come to be known as "the little way." According to Therese's writings, this "little way" was a simple way of being a Christian that is rooted in love for the Lord. It was an outgrowth of her conviction that she was a small person from a small town, she was lowborn and not especially well-educated, and great deeds were not an

option for her. That resonates with me, as it does with many people. Therese's insight is that just because a person is small and of little account on the world's stage, that does not mean that such a person cannot be a truly great disciple of Jesus. In the gospels, the Lord exhibits a preference for what is small and of little account in the eyes of the world. In fact, such people may be in a better position to participate in the transformation of the world that Jesus inaugurates and accomplishes. The "little way" of St. Therese was a way of practicing the faith that is rooted in such convictions, an outgrowth of the teaching of the gospel.

Therese wrote: "Love proves itself by deeds, so how am I to show my love? Great deeds are forbidden me. The only way I can prove my love is by scattering flowers and these flowers are every little sacrifice, every glance and word, and the doing of the least actions for love."

Recognizing the great wisdom hiding under the veil of her simplicity, he Mother Superior of Therese's convent ordered Therese to write an autobiography, which Therese dutifully did. The work, "The Story of a Soul," has become one of the most popular books of spirituality of the 20th and 21st centuries.

Therese contracted tuberculosis and after spending about a year in the infirmary, she died at the age of 24. Shortly before her death, Therese told her sisters "I have reached the point of not being able to suffer any more, because all suffering is sweet to me." In 1997, Pope John Paul II declared Therese to be one of the 39 "Doctors of the Church." It strikes me as a gospel-shaped irony that this humble, unlearned peasant girl, with her "little way of love," has taken her place right alongside the Church's towering fathers and doctors, men like St. John Chrysostom, St. Augustine, and St. Thomas Aquinas.

During this season around the feast of St. Therese, I pray that we would all find our little ways of loving devotion: humble, maybe even anonymous ways of doing nothing less than saving the world in the power of Christ.

EDUCATION

WELCOME BACK! All Saints has come alive again with the beginning of school, Children's Chapel, choir, and Wednesdays' Body and Soul.

Children's Chapel takes place during the 10:30 a.m. service as an option for parents and children who are not yet ready to experience the full liturgy together, though children are always welcome in "big" church. Children three years old through third grade begin in church with their parents, follow the children's shepherds and leaders out at the place marked in the bulletin, then rejoin their parents for the blessing.

Wednesdays' Body and Soul classes are separated into two groups: 1st-2nd grade and 3rd-5thgrade. Lessons are provided by Episcopal Church Curriculum. Two staff members supervise children younger than 5 by reading to them, helping them with arts and crafts, and playing with them on the playground. Middle and high school students have their own class. Many thanks to all our dedicated teachers, students, and parents!

There are lots of different volunteering opportunities for our Parish members to get to know our young people better. Even if you do not have school age children, please consider becoming a part of our education program. Some ways you can volunteer: volunteer to teach, help with the flashlight tour of the church in the winter, write a note to a class saying you are praying for the children in the class, reading a Bible story to children, help with an art project, help with filling Easter eggs and hiding eggs.... Please join us for our first fall event at Blue Bear Farm – the home of Dawna Bicknell Tanner and her husband, Mike. We will gather at their home on Thursday, October 25 from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m.

Among the Five Marks of Mission adopted in 1871 by the Episcopal Church's General Convention in organizing the Woman's Auxiliary Society, point 5 hit home for Dawna. It reads:

To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth.

Dawna has agreed to briefly introduce us to their motivations for developing a small family farm. She'll describe their commitment to raising nutrient dense grass-fed beef in a way that allows for the humane treatment of animals, respect for the land, and working in a way that benefits the ecosystem.

Their farm is located between Beachton and Cairo, off Highway 93, approximately 22 miles from the church. Carpooling is suggested given the distance and maps will be available before the event. Dress casually and if you want to tromp around outside, be sure to bring your boots or wear suitable shoes.

We hope you will join us to plant seeds of friendship for the new year, rejuvenate our spirits and find a common path toward fulfilling the various missions of ECW.
