Dear Friends,

For those of us who use the Church's calendar to direct our discipleship three important Sundays lie immediately ahead of us. June 2nd will be the Seventh Sunday of Easter and the Sunday after the Ascension. June 9 will be Pentecost, the day sometimes called the birthday of the Church. June 16 is Trinity Sunday. The altar guild will have a busy time changing the hangings in the Church. White for the Ascension, red for Pentecost, green for the weekdays after Pentecost, white for Trinity. After that they can take a break from their labors as we settle in for the long haul of the "green season" – the Sundays after Pentecost.

We will stay in the "green season" for a long time. It will not change until the first Sunday in Advent, which this year will be December 1. In the modern Roman Catholic calendar the "green season" is known as "ordinary time" as a way of distinguishing it from the rest of the year which is made up of specific seasons, Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, Pentecost.

Some people have a sense of disappointment about entering the "green season". They feel it is a let-down after all the spiritual high points of the other seasons. Its sheer length

feels rather daunting and there is a sense of 'blah'. But I want to suggest that the "green season", just plain, old "ordinary time", has its own particular spiritual richness – one that is a much needed antidote to the spirit of our times.

There can be a great sense of peace and stability that comes with the "ordinary". It is a respite from jumping from one high to another. Stability is also an important component of spiritual health. In fact, it is so important that when St. Benedict wrote his rule for the Benedictine communities, he added to the traditional three vows of poverty, chastity and obedience, the fourth vow of "stability". Benedictine monks are not to be wanderers, moving from place to place. Their vow is that they will remain in the same community as they enter. One Benedictine community's website describes it this way, "We live together, pray together, work together, relax together. We give up the temptation to move from place to place in search of an ideal situation. Ultimately there is no escape from oneself, and the idea that things would be better someplace else is usually an illusion. And when interpersonal conflicts arise, we have a great incentive to work things out and restore peace. This means learning the practices of love: acknowledging one's own offensive behavior, giving up one's preferences, forgiving."

My sense of the spirit of our time is that there is too much that encourages us to believe there is a possibility and desirability of escaping from ourselves and that someplace else would be better. In fact, instability is pandemic in our culture. What has happened to the idea of a "home town"? Thomasville has far more stability in that sense than most places, where almost no one stays for long. That means there are no lasting relationships between friends, professionals, customers, tradesmen and clients. What about a "home

church”? It seems people skip from church to church looking for that illusive place where all the sermons are great, the people friendly, the moral teachings affirm what they believe, and the liturgy is executed exactly to their liking. What about marriage? The vow that a person takes when they enter into a marriage is that they are committing themselves to stability in the relationship, in good times and bad, sickness and health, riches and poverty. Many, however, have the illusion of the ‘ideal’ relationship and if there is any ‘ordeal’ then it is time for change, a new ‘deal’.

Ordinary time, the green season. It seems to stretch out forever. It’s ho-hum. It’s the same every Sunday. Going to church and saying your prayers just become routine. There is not a lot to excite. There is just a stable contentment with what God has given us and no restless seeking for anything else. I think that is just the recipe for my spiritual life right now. How about you?
