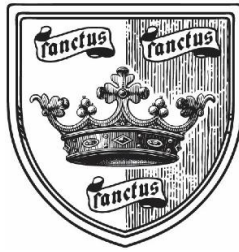

KNOW ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into his death? Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. For if we have been planted together in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection: knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin. For he that is dead is freed from sin. Now if we be dead with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him: knowing that Christ being raised from the dead dieth no more; death hath no more dominion over him. For in that he died, he died unto sin once: but in that he liveth, he liveth unto God. Likewise reckon ye also yourselves to be dead indeed unto sin, but alive unto God through Jesus Christ our Lord.

The Second Lesson

St. Matt. v. 20.

JESUS said unto his disciples, Except your righteousness shall exceed the righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in no case enter into the kingdom of heaven. Ye have heard that it was said by them of old time, Thou shalt not kill; and whosoever shall kill shall be in danger of the judgment: but I say unto you, That whosoever is angry with his brother with out a cause shall be in danger of the judgment: and whosoever shall say to his brother, Raca, shall be in danger of the council: but whosoever shall say, Thou fool, shall be in danger of hell fire. Therefore if thou bring thy gift to the altar, and there rememberest that thy brother hath ought against thee; leave there thy gift be fore the altar, and go thy way; first be reconciled to thy brother, and then come and offer thy gift. Agree with thine adversary quickly, whiles thou art in

the way with him; lest at any time the adversary deliver thee to the judge, and the judge deliver thee to the officer, and thou be cast into prison. Verily I say unto thee, Thou shalt by no means come out thence, till thou hast paid the uttermost farthing.

Brown will be on family holiday Jul. 20 - Aug. 8, during which there will be no weekday services in St. David's Chapel.* ✠ *The lessons appointed for weekday Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer for the weeks following the 6th and 7th Sundays after Trinity may be found on pages xxviii - xxxi of the Book of Common Prayer.* ✠ *The initials after the names of saints signify: B, bishop; and C, confessor; D, doctor; V, virgin; M, martyr; Ap., apostle.* ✠ *The "translation" of a saint marks the anniversary of that saint's relics being moved ("translated") from one place to another; in the case of St. Swithun, from his original grave outside of Winchester Cathedral to a shrine within the cathedral in the year 971 AD.*

GOING DEEPER

The Sixth Sunday After Trinity

Questions for Personal Reflection & Prayer

Quiet Judgments

Jesus teaches that anger without cause, dismissive contempt (“Raca”), and moral condemnation (“Thou fool”) already place us in danger of judgment. Where do subtle forms of irritation, superiority, or inner dismissal most readily surface in your life—toward colleagues, family members, neighbors, or people you encounter online? How does the Gospel’s exposure of the heart invite you to bring these movements into the light of Christ’s reconciliation before they harden into words or actions?

Walking in Newness of Life

Because we have been “planted together in the likeness of his death,” St. Paul says we “should walk in newness of life.” How does the grace already received in baptism both free us from sin’s service and bind us to this new way of living? Where might we be tempted to treat the Christian life as an optional add-on rather than the necessary fruit of union with Christ? In your daily decisions, how can you more intentionally live from what God has already given you?

A Higher Righteousness

Jesus declares that “except your righteousness shall exceed the righteousness of the Scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in no case enter into the kingdom of heaven.” In your religious practice, charitable giving, moral record, or leadership at home or work, where might you be settling for visible compliance or a respectable reputation without attending to the deeper transformation of your desires, motives, and relationships that new life in Christ makes possible? How does the first lesson’s emphasis on grace received (rather than effort alone) both humble and empower you to pursue this higher righteousness?

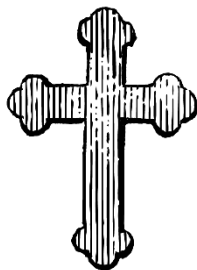
Holy Anger

Jesus teaches that anger without cause toward a brother places us in danger of judgment. But St. John Cassian notes that anger, rightly directed, can be spiritually profitable, namely when we “are indignant and rage against the lustful emotions of our heart” and the shameful things that rise in secret, “as we tremble at the presence of the angels, and of God Himself, who pervades all things everywhere.” How might the second lesson’s warning against outward

anger invite us to turn that energy inward—against our secret pride, resentment, lust, or self-deception—rather than against spouse, colleagues, neighbors, or even enemies? In prayer this week, ask Christ to convert your outward anger into interior vigilance. Name a secret sin before the Lord, and ask him to kill it.

Loving God Above All Things

In today's Collect, we pray that God would "pour into our hearts such love toward thee, that we, loving thee above all things, may obtain thy promises, which exceed all that we can desire." In a culture that trains us to place ultimate trust in achievement, security, family outcomes, or control, what would it mean for you to love God more than these things? How might the grace you received in baptism—union with Christ's death and victorious life—free you to entrust your deepest hopes and fears to the One who prepares blessings beyond imagining for those who love Him?
